ESTIMATED NUMBER OF AMERICANS IN COUNTRY

The US Consulate in Toronto estimated one million American citizens in Canada in answer to a telephone query in 2012.

These include people who:

- Immigrated to Canada and plan to live here indefinitely
- are living in Canada temporarily for work or education
- were born in Canada who have at least one American parent.

Americans living here are often fully integrated in Canadian life unlike most other countries where language and culture are very different. They do not need to find each other to speak English or find community. As a result, they must self-identify to make themselves known. We believe that most are primarily interested in exercising their right to vote. IRS and Treasury Department financial reporting requirements are an increasing concern.

HISTORICAL NOTE

DA Canada was established in 1988 based in Toronto as the country committee headquarters. Chapter formation began in 2003-04 with the formation of two chapters, Vancouver and Montreal. In 2007, chapter formation began in earnest. It was given a boost in 2008 by the DPCA International Meeting held in Vancouver and the contested Democratic primary from which Barak Obama emerged as the nominee. In 2009, a Toronto chapter was formed, separating it out from the DA Canada country committee.

MEMBERSHIP AS OF JANUARY 31 – Civimail Canada total 15,688

Canada has 15 chapters and another five concentrations of less than 100 members who meet, especially around elections. Enquiries have been

received from members in smaller cities who have expressed an interest and are being pursued. The chapters are:

Americans are concentrated in the large cities, especially Toronto, Vancouver and Montreal and the chapter numbers of over 1,000 reflect that. The second tier with chapter members of 500 to 1,000 includes Victoria, Ottawa/Gatineau, Kitchener-Waterloo and Hamilton. A third tier includes smaller chapters from Calgary, Nova Scotia (Halifax), Nova Scotia (Yarmouth area), Edmonton, London, Niagara, Saskatchewan/NWT, Windsor and Winnipeg. Niagara and London do not have active leadership at this time. Efforts will be made to interest members there into assuming a more active role.

In addition, free weekly papers (such as *NOW* in Toronto and *Vue* in Edmonton) are sources for articles and announcements. There are also community newspapers – usually published by small companies with several outlets. Circulation is done by neighborhood. They are useful for feature articles as well as for showcasing local Democrats Abroad members and events in their respective areas.

FUNDRAISING HISTORY

\$ 450 Funds contributed by DA Canada members to the DPCA October cocktail party fundraiser with Congresswoman Debbie Wasserman-Schultz.

FUNDS RAISED FOR COUNTRY COMMITTE

\$13,221 was raised for the 2010 election with a raffle. This was combined with around \$8,000 from the treasury, which was a portion of the \$21,000 (gross) raised at Toronto's 2008 election night event. This will not be the case in 2012 as the election night event will be under the auspices of the Toronto chapter. Other funds were received as follows: \$476 was raised at a tax seminar. \$485 was recovered from an 'ask' in the membership verification mailing as of January 21. Around \$1,500 has come in since. The top amount in the treasury for 2012 was \$4,744.31.

WORKING WITH NEIGHBORING COMITTEES

DA Canada has had little person-to person contact with neighboring committees except at DPCA meetings as our nearest 'neighbor', Mexico, is south of the United States. There has been active participation in regional meeting conference calls.

Members of the Executive Committee have participated in DPCA Committees including Voter Registration; FBAR/FATCA; By-Laws; Affirmative Action; IT; Long Range Strategy and Best Practices.

PERFORMANCE AGAINST LAST YEAR'S GOALS

Increase in membership:

Membership in DAC has steadily increased over the years and stands at 15,207, the highest membership of any CC. 2011 saw a 15% increase and in 2012, a 13% increase.

GOVERNANCE

Chapter representation on the DA Canada Executive Committee ranges from Yarmouth, NS to Victoria BC.

Officers:

Chair (Victoria), Executive Vice-Chair (Toronto), Vice-Chair (Edmonton) and the other Vice Chair (Toronto), Recording Secretary (Victoria), Treasurer (Toronto), Council (Montreal), and Membership Secretary (Vancouver). The three Members At Large are from the following chapters: Victoria, Yarmouth and Toronto.

All chapters are invited to participate in ExCom meetings with one vote each. Larger chapters are entitled to additional voting members based on numbers.

DPCA voting representatives

DA Canada has six DPCA Voting Representatives. These include a past chair of DAC who is based in Toronto, the DAC Counsel based in Montreal, the chapter chair from Vancouver, a DAC Vice-chair and Chapter Chair from Edmonton, the DAC Membership Secretary, and a Member at Large from Toronto.

Chapters engaged in volunteer recruitment, GOTV and social activities. As 2012 was an election year, there was intense voter registration activity with a very large number of registration events and venues right across the country. Of particular note was the Call a Swing State Voter Phone Banking Campaign. Fifty-seven volunteers from across Canada each called 50 swing-state voters culled from the DAC database. Approximately 1,000 voters were reached by phone and another 1,200 messages were left. A second phone-banking campaign targeted the Senate race in Massachusetts. The leadership and base were highly motivated to register to vote and to vote....and Yes, we did!

Presently, we are engaged in cross-country phone banking campaign for the Senate seat vacated by John Kerry.

In addition, Vice-chair Joe Green conducted voter registration training for V-R volunteers.

FUNDRAISING

DAC does not have many major donors and has not sponsored high-ticket events in the past year. We hope that this will change as people identify themselves or are identified. Most of this effort will be targeted toward following up on small to moderate donors and asking them to upgrade. In addition, it is hoped that we will have some 'visiting Americans' that we can build a fundraising lunch, cocktail party or dinner around when visiting Democrat speakers and attractions come here. DAC appreciated the opportunity to host Congressman Mike Honda four years ago and former DNC Chair Howard Dean three years ago. We did a luncheon a few years ago when Madeline Albright came but we seldom hear of opportunities for

this caliber of event at all, let alone far enough in advance to organize such a fundraising event as they do in Europe. Because we are so close to the United States, a visiting dignitary who comes here for another reason can fly in and out the same day.

TECHNICAL INFRASTRUCTURE

DA Canada uses the Civimail to communicate with members about matters of general interest such as the FBAR/FATCA briefing and GOTV. Future communications will be going out on bi-elections such as the Massachusetts Senate race, and the midterm elections in 2014.

DAC's day-to-day use of technical infrastructure has taken place mainly at the chapter level. Training and orientation is necessary in order to ensure the country committee and chapter leaders are able to take full advantage of recent improvements in Civimail and the web site. In addition, DAC and Chapter Facebook comments and pictures keep members in the loop in an informal way.

DAC participates in the database training offered by Gail Fagen so that we can take full advantage of our database. We have already used it to determine how many DAC members vote in each of the thirty-three states where there were US Senate races last year. Ten states (NY, CA, MI, MA, PA, OH, FL, WA, NJ and Texas) account for around 60% of our members. We hope to hold state-based 'coffees' and meet-ups by neighborhood to provide information and galvanize members to become active in fundraising and phone banking.

DAC made a big effort in 2012 to update and verify our membership list through the membership certification exercise chaired by Adrienne Jones. All opted out members (1,946) were checked and more than 200 moved to the opted in category. Over 200 members without working emails were telephoned and 2,301 members with no phone or email were sent snail mail letters along with a request for contributions. Contributions were recovered for around 80% of the cost of the mailing. Over \$1,800 was raised. Early in

2013, DAC hired a professional company to make 1,000 robo-calls to help verify membership. Planning continues for another membership campaign chaired by David Katz, Membership Secretary.

We were unable to contact opt-out members due to the down time with the revamped Civimail system early in 2013.

FRAMING THE DEBATE

Much of the media contact this past year has related to the FBAR and FATCA committee chaired by Joe Green and especially to getting out the vote for the Obama/Biden ticket. Other media contact happens at the chapter level. Talking points and political observations are posted to Facebook. Our communications manager sends out talking points as we receive them from Jody Couser. Future media contact will center on GOTV for bi-elections such as the Massachusetts campaign, the mid-term elections and FBAR/FATCA.

KEY CONSTITUENCIES

In 2012, we did student outreach at a number of universities, especially through paid advertising for GOTV in campus newspapers, posters, and by having tables during orientation week or other open periods. We are grateful that campus advertising was supported by the DPCA. Some chapters have student outreach committees and organized special events for students. As most chapters have at least one university with American students, this will be a major thrust in 2013- 2014. The new Chapter Chair of Montreal is a student studying at McGill University. There is a new Democrats and Friends Club at the University of Toronto.

DAC reaches out to the LGBT community primarily through participation in Gay Pride activities and through placing announcements and ads in *Xtra* and related publications.

Outreach to the Black community has primarily been through presence at Caribana and related events including Black History month performances and events.

There has been less outreach to other ethnic communities, as Americans do not seem to make up significant proportions of their membership in Canada.

DAC purchased and distributed buttons and bumper stickers for country committees; mobilized volunteers in two significant phone banking campaigns previously mentioned; provided and shared talking points among chapters; and encouraged chapters to hold outreach activities.

Face-to-face activities in Canada

Activities in Canada take place at the chapter level. Chapters have indicated that they have done or plan to engage in the following:

In addition, opportunities come up during the year such as Jon Stewart and Steven Colbert's 'Rally to Restore Sanity' last year that provide opportunities for trolling or V-R tables.

Fundraising plans are being made at chapter and national levels.

GOTV will be the major effort of volunteers in any bi-election and in the forthcoming midterm election year. Almost all of the above activities will include a voter registration component.

COMMUNICATIONS

A communications and media team will be established to handle press contacts and member information efforts. Our Vice-chair, Adrienne Jones, continued to send out memos in 2013 to chapter leaders asking for help in creating fresh local media lists. The response was better than the last year's. Adrienne wants to create a database of all appropriate media across Canada that would be accessible to chapter leaders and their designated communications contacts.

The DPCA memos, White House emails and talking points from Jody Couser are forwarded regularly to all chapter leaders with encouragement to utilize them in their own media relations.

DA Canada plans to continue, as in the past, sending templates, news releases on key topics to other materials to chapter communications contacts to tailor to their local needs.

National media contacts are handled primarily in Toronto but also in Montreal and Vancouver.

Media training

We will use David Miller's outline on the "Do's and Don'ts of Media Interviews". As well, we have professional journalists and public relations professionals to help train chapter communications contacts and leadership.

Advertising

In 2010, DA Canada used close to \$20,000 raised from a raffle and from the election night event for advertising and GOTV. Advertising was intended primarily for on-line outlets such as Google, Talking Points Memo, Daily Kos and the on-line edition of Xtra. However, this plan was modified to include Globe and Mail ads and special announcements during the G20.

DA Canada is willing to pool funds for DPCA advertising buys with consultation. Note: the International Herald Tribune is not useful to reach Americans in Canada, as it is not frequently read here.
